

### Update from HWAM

Dear Friends,

As we enter the summer season, we see consistent progress. This seasonal shift reflects a broader pattern of steady growth in the natural world and within the programs at Hearts With A Mission.

As growth occurs in God's creation, our programs show measurable development. This progress is directly linked to the continued support of our volunteers and donors. Your engagement is evidence of investment, seen clearly through expanding our services and outreach across our communities.

One example is our Hearts for Seniors Program, which assists isolated seniors aged 65 and older. Staff and volunteers have provided home visits, yard care, transportation, and grocery support, helping meet essential needs and reduce isolation. These simple but impactful actions offer stability and connection to those who often live alone with limited resources.

Many seniors have shared that the expectation of regular companionship has improved their overall outlook. Notably, one-third of those we serve report having no emergency contact, underscoring the importance of this program and the critical role our volunteers play in creating support systems that fulfill these needs.

This program's growth points to a rising need for connection and support among older adults. Every interaction helps improve well-being and reflects the value of your contribution. As I watch the Hearts for Seniors program and witness our broader mission, I celebrate the relationships built, connections made, and the lives shown compassion and hope for a better future. We recently launched Hearts for Seniors in all the counties we serve.

### **Expanding Hearts to Serve Seniors**

Our hearts are full as we expand our Hearts for Seniors program from Jackson County to serve more isolated seniors, 65 and older living independently in Josephine, Lincoln, Coos, and Klamath counties. In Josephine County, nine senior clients living in Grants Pass, Merlin, Cave Junction, Takilma, Selma, and O'Brien were established in just six weeks. Meanwhile eight compassionate and generous volunteers have already trained to come alongside and provide individualized companion care and special project assistance.

Gena (pictured) has been enjoying a weekly visit and also enjoys a home cooked microwaveable meal now and then, which was prepared by yet another generous volunteer in Jackson County.



Carol was recently matched with a local volunteer who will provide rides to critical appointments after her car's transmission went out. 


## Sowing seeds of love

From toddlers just finding their footsteps to a remarkable 94-year-old participant, it was truly inspiring to see our community come together in support of our mission.


Watching smiles light up faces and spirits unite, reminded us why we do what we do.

Then came an unexpected family change—one that hit like a wave. It knocked her off balance. Thankfully a friend connected Brenda to Safe Families of Coos County.



They recognized how desperately she needed a chance to rest and take a break. They soon connected her to the perfect family who would host her kids for a night allowing her to get some rest and have a chance to process her situation.

That little break gave Brenda a respite and the energy to continue caring for her kids. This support was so helpful for Brenda that the Host Family offered to be available to host her kids whenever she needed a break. Safe Families also found a Family Friend to be a listening ear for her, taking so much stress off of her, and giving her an adult to connect with as she processed life.

While her circumstances haven't changed, Brenda no longer feels alone and that makes all the difference. She also knows that when she absolutely needs a break, a chance to rest, or just a friend to talk to, she just needs to call Safe Families.

## A Dad's journey

When Hearts With a Mission (HWAM) first met Larry, he was overwhelmed and broken. He had lost part of his left leg, several toes on his right foot, his job, and now faced raising twin toddlers alone. His utilities had been shut off, and he was barely hanging on.

Larry often called HWAM—sometimes for help, other times just for a kind voice. One day, a creditor called: his unpaid bill had tripled, and he had 30 days to pay or lose his home. The HWAM team knew this was beyond them. They prayed—and called Theresa, a retired attorney and dedicated volunteer.

Theresa met with Larry, reviewed the paperwork, and sat beside him as he made the difficult return call. Thanks to her help, a 30-day extension was granted. Afterward, she prayed with Larry and shared how her own husband had also lost a leg.

"How is he... inside?" Larry asked through tears.

Theresa was honest about the struggles, but also shared how God's love carried them through. In that moment, something changed in Larry. He felt peace and a spark of hope.

Then, just before the deadline, Theresa received a call. A stranger—moved by a nudge they couldn't explain—wanted to donate to someone in crisis.

She knew exactly who needed help.

Because of that unexpected gift, Larry and his children remained in their home.

Hope was restored. Faith rekindled. A miracle witnessed—not just by Larry, but by everyone who walked the journey with him.
